Report of the Directors For the Year Ended 31 March 2022

The Directors are pleased to present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2022.

Structure, Governance and Management

Stop Climate Chaos Scotland is a company limited by guarantee, with the liability of members limited to £1 each. The company is governed by the terms of its Memorandum and Articles of Association and is a registered Scottish charity.

The company comprises of Guarantor Members and Directors.

The Guarantor Members, that is members with voting rights, can be individuals, organisations, institutions and other bodies. Each Member, who is not an individual, appoints a representative to act on its behalf. The minimum number of guarantor members is four.

The company is managed by between three and twelve Directors. The Directors are appointed for a term not exceeding three years, and are eligible for reappointment for a second and subsequent terms not exceeding three years each.

The names of those who were members of the Board during the year are shown on page 2 together with other reference and administrative information.

Objectives and Review of Activities

The object of the company are:

- a) the promotion for the benefit of the public of the conservation, protection, rehabilitation and improvement of the physical and natural environment, and
- b) the relief of poverty and the improvement of the conditions of life and socially and economically disadvantaged communities, and
- c) to advance the education of the public in relation to
 - i. sustainable development, and
 - ii. the prudent use of natural resources, and
 - iii. sustainable means of achieving economic growth and regeneration, and
- d) to promote study and research into aforementioned objects making the useful results available.

For the purposes of these objects sustainable development means "development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs".

Domestic policy

The start of the year was dominated by the Scottish elections, and was then closely followed by the news that Scotland had missed its emissions reduction targets for the third year in a row. We called for urgent action across all sectors to address this alarming trend but especially in transport, where progress continues to be slower than other sectors.

We wrote to the First Minister calling on her to quickly, clearly and publicly call for a rejection of the proposed Cambo oil field to demonstrate Scotland's true leadership and commitment to climate justice ahead of COP26. The First Minister did later come out in opposition.

We responded to several consultations and published briefings, including:

- Response to public consultation by Transport Scotland to inform the development of an Aviation Strategy
- SCCS evidence to NZET Committee Inquiry into the role of local government in financing and delivering a net-zero Scotland
- SCCS Briefing for Net Zero, Energy and Transport Committee Debate: COP26 Outcomes & Implications for Scotland's Climate Policies

International policy

A key COP26 project was the Glasgow Climate Dialogues - four online sessions from 6-9 September 2021 that were designed to engage with, learn from and platform key Global South stakeholders on climate change ahead of COP26. Each session was co-hosted by the Scottish Government and Scottish civil society and focused on a specific theme:

- Access, Participation and Voice
- · Adaptation and Resilience
- Loss and Damage
- Just Transition

The sessions resulted in a communique that we presented at several events at COP26. At one event the First Minster directly linked what Scottish Government had heard from Glasgow Climate Dialogue participants with their decision to champion the issue of Loss and Damage.

We secured a meeting with the First Minister at COP26, which was an opportunity for partners from the global south to share their experiences of the climate crisis and their asks of rich polluting nations.

One of our asks for COP26 was for the Scottish Government to publish an indicative Nationally Determined Contribution, and they did so in July 2021. This was a snapshot of its existing climate policy and we hoped it would encourage others to publish strong commitments. However, with the content based on existing policies that are not on track to meet targets we urged the Scottish Government to urgently up its game and get on track to achieve its legally-binding commitments.

Another ask was for the Scottish Government to increase their Climate Justice Fund, that had been frozen for several years. They announced the fund would double ahead of COP26.

We published briefings, including:

- · Briefing for Holyrood debate on COP26 ambition and action
- Briefing for House of Commons on COP26 and limiting temperature rises to 1.5 degrees
- Briefing for members business Publication of the Communiqué Setting Out the Conclusions of the Glasgow Climate Dialogues

Public campaigns and media

SCCS collaborated with members of Scottish Environment LINK on the 'oorfuture' pre-election campaign, with supporters showing that climate and nature mattered through coordinated social media posts.

We launched the Climate Scotland campaign to demonstrate to leaders that many people in Scotland want strong and meaningful action to tackle the climate and nature emergency. Members of the public were able to add their voice to the campaign, say what they care about and send a message to COP26 through various events and promotions at the conference. Over 7000 people took part and we worked with a range of new partners from across civil society.

During COP26 we released blogs written by our members on each day of the conference, sharing their thoughts on some of the key issues being discussed that day.

We issued the following press releases and media statements:

- Scots urged to open homes to welcome climate campaigners coming to Glasgow for COP26
- Charities and community groups get together to action the climate movement in Scotland
- · Climate emissions results 'alarming'; serious action needed to meet targets
- People of Scotland have their say on the climate and nature emergency
- Groups of charities welcome Scottish Government's publication of climate plans but urge faster, stronger action overall
- Scotland to promote priorities of Global South on the climate crisis during Glasgow Climate Dialogues ahead of COP26

- Climate Fringe Week: Scotland's big call for climate action ahead of COP26

- Artists inspired by Scotland's messages to COP26
- Global South representatives praise First Ministers climate leadership but challenge her to meet emission targets and oppose new oil

COP26 project

We successfully delivered a number of projects to welcome global civil society to Glasgow and manage logistics around COP26, including:

- Climate Fringe we set up climatefringe.org as an events hub where people could find out about all civil society-led events during COP26 – whether in the Blue Zone or the Green Zone, and throughout Glasgow in the civil society and community spaces. We had nearly 200,000 page views of the events listing during COP26. We coordinated the Climate Fringe Festival in September which saw over 200 events held to build momentum ahead of COP26.
- Homestay Network we set up a network of local hosts willing to host COP visitors in their homes to help people struggling to find affordable accommodation, particularly those from lessresourced groups and countries. Nearly 1700 people were hosted in Glasgow and surrounding area.
- Glasgow Green Map crowd sourced map that listed the best in sustainable shops, communityowned or locally-owned sustainable cafes and restaurants, bike shops, community gardens, parks and hidden gems to visit during COP26
- Spaces for change gathering community and faith venues in Glasgow to offer facilities for global
 civil society when they come to COP. We secured bookable spaces of all types and sizes for
 meetings, events, hot desking, exhibitions, studio and rehearsal space. Priority was given to
 those travelling from Global South countries, or for under-resourced groups and those coming
 from the front line of the climate crisis.
- We managed over 700 volunteers who helped at the mobilisation, at the civil society hub and many other activities.

Financial review

At the end of the financial year the carry forward sum was £142,649, of which £97,015 was unrestricted, and £45.6341 was restricted. This represents an increase of total funds by £4,665 compared with previous year.

It is the Directors' policy to maintain unrestricted reserves equal to at least three months expenditure comma with a minimum of £15,000. This target was met at the year end.

Independent Examiner's Report To the Directors of Stop Climate Chaos Scotland

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022 which are set out on pages 8 to 14.

Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)' – referred to as 'the Charities SOPR'. The charity is a public benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has applied the alternative structure for smaller charities allowed under paragraph 4.2 of the Charities SORP and has not reported on activity basis. Similarly, as a smaller charity, a cash flow statement has not been prepared.

Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

Income from annual grants is recognised in the period to which the grant relates. Any annual grants received in advance are included as deferred grants in creditors. Income from other grants and donations is recognised on receipt.

Where a grant or donation is received for a specific purpose, it is included in restricted income and any unexpended portion carried forward as a restricted fund.

Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Debtors

Debtors are recognized at the settlement amount due.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognized, at settlement amount, where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event, which is likely to result in the transfer of funds to a third party, and the mount due can be measured or estimated reliably

Fixed assets

Fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses. Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the costs or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following basis:

Fixtures and fittings

25% straight line

Expenditure below £500 pounds is not capitalised, the gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and carrying value of the asset, and is recognised and net income expenditure for the year.

Taxation

The company is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities. The company is not registered for VAT and expenditure includes VAT where relevant.

Fund accounting

Restricted funds may only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the charity as specified by the donor or by the terms of an application for the funds.

The *Unrestricted general fund* is available to be used for any of the charitable objects at the discretion of the Directors.

Notes on Funds

(a) Funding was received from a number of donors to support campaigning activities in the run up to and during COP 26, as well as legacy work. The transfer represents purchase of fixed assets.

11. Trustee expenses and remuneration

None of the trustees received any remuneration or benefits in the year (2021: £2,400). No expense reimbursements were paid to Trustees by the charity in either current or previous year.

12. Volunteers

Approximately 1,000 volunteers, jointly manages by SCCS and COP26 Coalition, supported the work in the run up and during COP26 including Covid-19 safety, fringe events and stewarding the Day of Action.

13. Prior year adjustment

The cash at bank figure has been restated to reflect actual bank balance at the end of previous year. The increase in cash totalled £31,313. The cash discrepancy was primarily a result of incorrect treatment of creditors in previous period. A creditor of £29,302 was identified and included in restated balance sheet. Fixed assets with carrying value of £819 were also included. The restricted funds balance was increased by £1,463 in line with company's management accounts. The remaining £1,367 resulted in an increase to the unrestricted funds.
